A Message from the Board

Redlands is celebrating our 140th anniversary in 2024. As one of the oldest schools in Sydney, generations of families have attended Redlands. We cherish our history and strong foundations. We honour our past and all who contributed to it.

At the same time, Redlands is also a contemporary school. Our success continues to be grounded in our forward thinking ethos and our commitment to pursuing personal excellence. The value of Service remains at the heart of our School. Our healthy enrolments reflect the strong support of our community for our educational offering.

This openness to new ideas and renewal is in the DNA of Redlands. We were the first school in Australia to introduce Kindergarten classes; we were an early adopter of coeducation; and one of the first schools in Australia to introduce the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme. In 2023, our School has embraced renewal with changes in our senior leadership and many initiatives across a range of activities.

At the beginning of this year I was delighted to commission our 12th Principal, Mr Sean Corcoran. As our previous Deputy Principal, Mr Corcoran has made a seamless transition to this leadership role with his characteristic intellect and enthusiasm.

This year we welcomed Ms Sabine Partington as our new Deputy Principal and we are very grateful for the skills she has brought to her position. Mr Corcoran and Ms Partington have proven to be an outstanding team and I thank them both for their exemplary service to Redlands in 2023.

Embracing the Future

The School Board recognises that we operate in a complex and ever changing world. We are aware that the future careers of many of our students have not been invented yet. In this changing world, our School must not only prepare our students for academic success but also prepare them to be independent, critical thinkers who are able to adapt, create and shape their own future and make a constructive contribution to our world.

Initiatives at Redlands to prepare our students for the future world of work include developing problem solving and entrepreneurial skillsets, as well as a familiarity with new technologies. Some recent examples include:

- A nine month collaboration between UNICEF Australia and our Year 6 students on developing solutions to challenges faced by children in natural disasters;
- Year 9 students participating in a masterclass at the University of Technology (UTS) Startups to learn how to pitch their ideas from their Term 3 Commerce projects; and
- Year 10 students participating in the Biotech Futures competition at the University of Sydney, presenting on ways to solve diverse biotechnology challenges.

I'd like to thank Ms Green, our Innovation and Entrepreneurial Learning Strategist, for her efforts and enthusiasm.

One of the biggest changes to the world of education occurred only last year with the release of ChatGPT. The impending widespread introduction of Artificial Intelligence (AI) had been considered by our School Board and Executive some years previously and the likely emergence of AI had prompted a number of initiatives in our Strategic Plan. However, the reality of such extraordinary new technology changes many aspects of education - from assessments to course content, to mention just two examples.

AI is both hugely exciting and terrifying in equal measure. Developing strategies to thrive in an AI enabled world is another challenge that our students and our School must adapt to. While it is still early days, Redlands is embracing this challenge. Not only have we adjusted our Redlands Learning Platform, we are also leaning into possibilities. We began by hosting an AI workshop for students from a number of schools on the lower north shore area. This workshop included materials by Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) and University of New South Wales (UNSW) and was designed to equip students to thrive in an AI-enabled world.

Developing global perspectives is another characteristic that we consider important for future success for our young people. Students at Redlands come from over 50 countries and our goal is to strengthen their capacity to think of themselves as global citizens. To enable this, we have joined the global Round Square network of schools. This group of 230 schools in around 50 countries connects and collaborates to offer world class programs and experiences.

During the year, our students joined with around 200 students from other NSW based Round Square schools to learn about marine life on World Ocean Day and further opportunities to connect with schools in this network are planned.

These programs are excellent examples of how Redlands is embracing the future.

Student Achievements

Redlands is an academically non-selective school and we are delighted with the achievements and many personal bests of our students.

The Class of 2023 achieved exceptional results in their HSC and IB exams.

Highlights from the 2023 academic year include:

- 16 students achieved an ATAR of 98 or more
- 39 students achieved an ATAR of 95 or more
- 70 students achieved an ATAR of 90 or more
- 210 HSC Bands 6s/IB Grades 7/A were awarded
- 53% of students qualified for the HSC Distinguished Achievers List or were IB top grade achievers
- 3 students were named on the HSC All-Rounders List
- 18 students received 21 nominations and 3 students were selected for HSC Showcases for their major works
- The Class of 2023 received 148 Early Offers to universities, both nationally and globally.

In the cocurricular arena, we saw some thrilling sporting competitions and spine tingling performances in Music, Dance and Drama and were incredibly proud of our Redlands student representing Australia in the Australasian Economics Olympiad.

Facilities

Our upgrades to school facilities have continued. During the year, we celebrated our heritage in recognising the centenary of the Liggins building on the Senior Campus; and classrooms and the exterior of the building have been updated. Thank you to all members of our Redlands community who supported the restoration appeal for this wonderful historic building where generations of Redlands students have been educated.

Earlier this year, the School ran a competitive process to select an architect to undertake master planning at Redlands. The School selected leading architectural practice Architectus to undertake a new Master Plan for our School and new plans are being developed across all three campuses.

There are two other updates on projects relating to facilities. The first is the renewal of our sports facility partnership with Macquarie University for the next 20 years. The upgrade of the University and Northern Ovals was completed and officially opened in December, enabling our sports teams to play on all-weather surfaces on those two ovals.

Secondly, a long term home for our school Tennis program has been found at the Mosman Lawn Tennis Club, where the courts have all been upgraded.

New Constitution

Another important achievement for this year was the adoption of a new Constitution for our School. Our new Constitution was the first major update to our primary governing document in 40 years. It now recognises that we operate under many new laws and regulations that simply didn't exist 40 years ago. I thank all of the members of SCECGS Redlands Limited who supported the School Board in achieving this significant modernisation effort.

New Uniform

Finally, our School is adopting a new uniform from Term 1 2024. This is our first major uniform change for 40 years and we are modernising our approach to the school uniform. There will no longer be winter or summer categories, but multiple trans-seasonal pieces that can be worn throughout the year, depending upon the weather. The uniform can also adapt for more formal occasions and provide comfort for activity and learning. A great deal of thought has gone into the fabrics, colours and design and we look forward to students and families embracing this change.

Redlands Foundation Fundraising Appeals

There are many people who contribute to the success of Redlands, and I thank everyone who donated to the Redlands Foundation fundraising appeals. Your contributions supported the Dr Sue Morey AM Scholarship as well as the Liggins Building Restoration Appeal.

We are very proud of our means-tested scholarship program at Redlands, which allows for talented students who would otherwise not be able to attend our School to have access to all of the opportunities available here. Your continued support for our scholarship program means that we will be able to offer two new means-tested scholarships for Year 7 students commencing in 2024 and continue to grow our scholarship program to ensure these important scholarships can be awarded to future Redlands students.

In 2025, we plan to award a new means-tested scholarship in honour of Coralie Amos OAM who graduated from Redlands in 1964. Service to others sits at the heart of Redlands and Coralie was awarded an OAM in 2021 for her dedication to Service. She has devoted herself to contributing to the Australian National Museum of Education, Meals on Wheels and the local hospital. She has also promoted golf as a healthy sport for women and girls for more than 37 years. Her contributions are very much aligned to what we value at Redlands.

Moonbah Experiential Learning Program

Our flagship Winter School program has operated at our High Country Campus for nearly 30 years, having first operated in 1996. In 2022, I announced that Redlands had purchased 214 hectares next to our High Country Campus and in 2023 we advised that we would introduce a new Experiential Learning Program commencing in 2025. This will involve all of Year 9 spending a term living and learning at High Country Campus, with half of the Year Group participating in Term 1 and the other half in Term 2; while Winter School will continue in Term 3.

This new Moonbah program will allow our Year 9 students to embrace the natural world and learn more about themselves. Our current Year 7s will be the first Year Group to go on this program and we will make sure our students have an amazing experience. This will be a place and time where many wonderful memories will be made.

This year, we opened an appeal to support the construction of new buildings at the High Country Campus. Gifts to this Appeal will support the expansion of student and staff accommodation in this stunning setting and will benefit students for years to come. The Foundation Office will be sharing more information in 2024.

Congratulations to Mr Castelli on his promotion to Director of Learning and Growth (P-12), and to Mr Weatherstone on his efforts in advancing sustainability initiatives, which has seen Redlands being awarded the 2023 NSW Sustainable School of the Year. We appreciate the enormous efforts of all of our teaching and operational staff whose contributions have been exemplary.

At the end of 2023 we farewelled a much loved member of the Executive, Mr Ari Guha, Head of Junior School. Redlands has been so fortunate to have had Mr Guha leading our Junior School and being a part of Redlands for 18 years. We value his expertise, kindness and friendship and wish him every success in his new career in Executive Coaching. We welcome Mr Ian Holden who will be the Acting Head of Junior School for 2024.

Finally, I thank my fellow Board Directors who give their time in the service of the School. Special thanks to three Directors who have retired from the Board, Michael Winram, John Pradel and Reverend Tim St Quintin. Reverend St Quintin is leaving St Peter's Church across the road from the Senior Campus, to move to Mudgee. We wish him every success in his new Ministry. We welcome three new Directors, Juliet Wenden and Christian Cooksley, who are both parents of Redlands students, and Megan Coall to the Board.

At the time, I said I was extremely honoured and privileged to serve as the new principal of Redlands. At the end of 2023, looking back on the past year and all that the staff and students have achieved, I feel even more honoured and privileged to serve as the principal of Redlands.

2023 Highlights

There have been many outstanding achievements this year in support of the implementation of our Strategic Plan and I specifically make mention the following initiatives:

- The implementation of new innovation programs such as the Year 9 Experience projects and partnerships with industry and universities
- Our increasing involvement with the Round Square network of schools, allowing students to connect and collaborate with a network of 230 like-minded schools from 50 countries around the world
- The continued planning for our Year 9 residential Experiential Learning Program to commence in 2025
- The expansion of our iGrow data analytics platform across P-12, nurturing a culture of collaborative growth
- The creation, publication and communication of an updated P-12 Student Wellbeing Framework
- The development of our Master Plan across all three campuses, due to be shared with our community in Term 2 2024
- The progress that has been made in furthering environmental sustainability initiatives at the School, which saw us being awarded the 2023 Sustainable School of the Year at the 2023 NSW Environmental Education Awards.

I congratulate our 2024 student leaders and School Captains, Jasmine Black and Isaac Brooks, for so quickly and successfully picking up the mantle of leadership and for encouraging all of us to step outside our comfort zones, through their motto, Step Beyond.

And finally, I thank the student body for continuing to live our Redlands values each and every day, for their openness to let their own individual lights shine in so many different ways, and for the joy they bring to the campus.

Financial Summary

The reportable income including Government recurrent per capita funding for the year ended 31 December 2023 was \$72.4M. School income was 7.5% higher than 2022 due to tuition fee increase and additional student numbers enrolled.

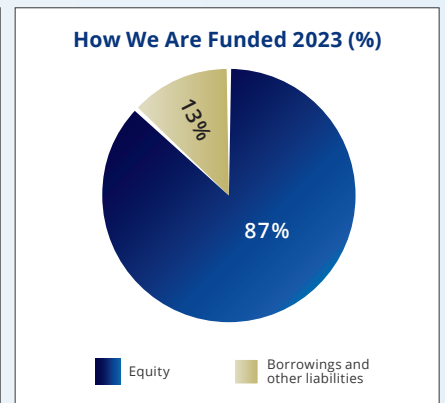
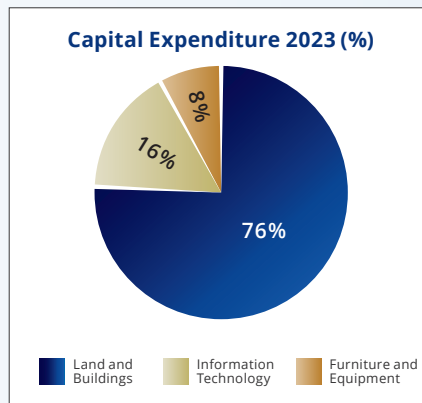
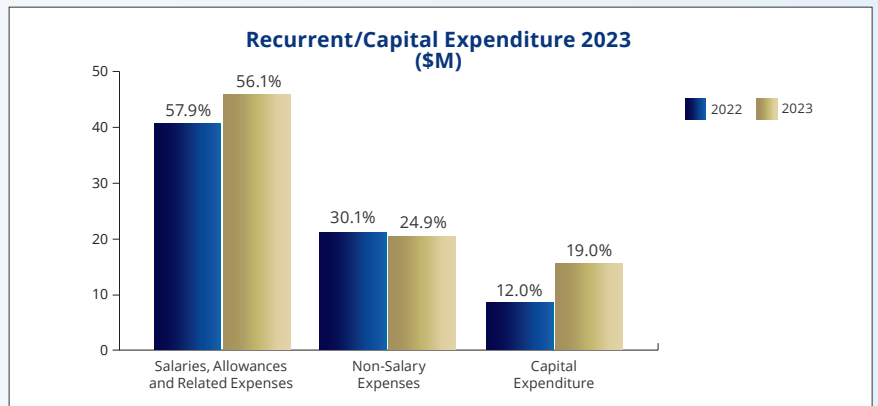
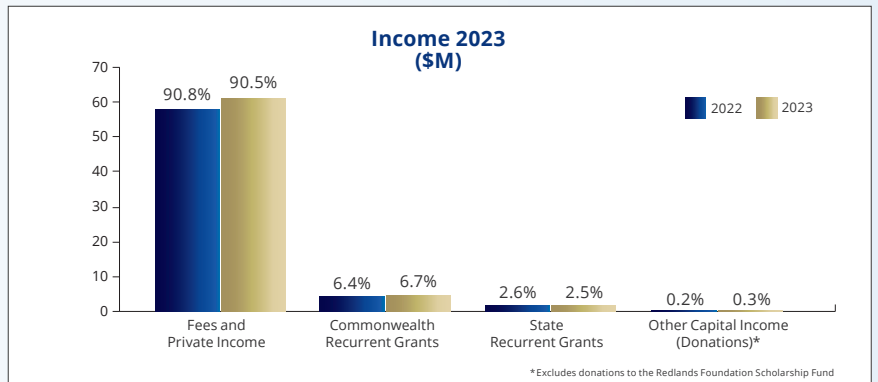
The School achieved a solid performance in 2023, generating \$11.5M in net cash from operating activities and continues to recognise the importance of further action required to effectively manage increasing pressure on School revenue and expenses.

Operational expenses increased by 15.1% in 2023 to \$71.1M. This was primarily attributable to higher payroll expenses and higher depreciation expenses resulting from the significant recent investments in buildings on the Senior Campus

Capital Expenditure of \$15.5M during 2023 included \$4.3M for the Macquarie University Northern Oval Synthetic Surface redevelopment, \$3.9M for the 2A Winnie Street property acquisition, \$1.3M for the Mosman Lawn Tennis Club upgrade, \$1.2M for the Liggins Building Centenary refurbishment program, \$1.0M for the Parkes Building Level 1 refurbishment program, \$0.6M for Cyber Security infrastructure and software upgrades and enhancements, \$0.4M for Disaster recovery infrastructure, as well as other upgrades to ICT infrastructure and the acquisition of various furnitures and fixtures.

In 2023 the SCECGS Redlands Scholarship Fund received \$0.2M from donations and \$0.2M from interest income. The end balance of Assets Under Management as of 31 December was \$3.34M.

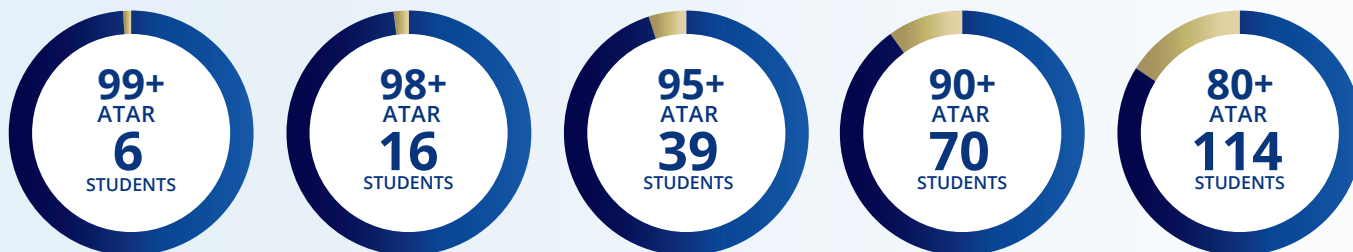
Maintaining diligent fiscal management will be important in the coming years, as the School focusses on the five strategic outcomes within the 2025 Strategic Plan.

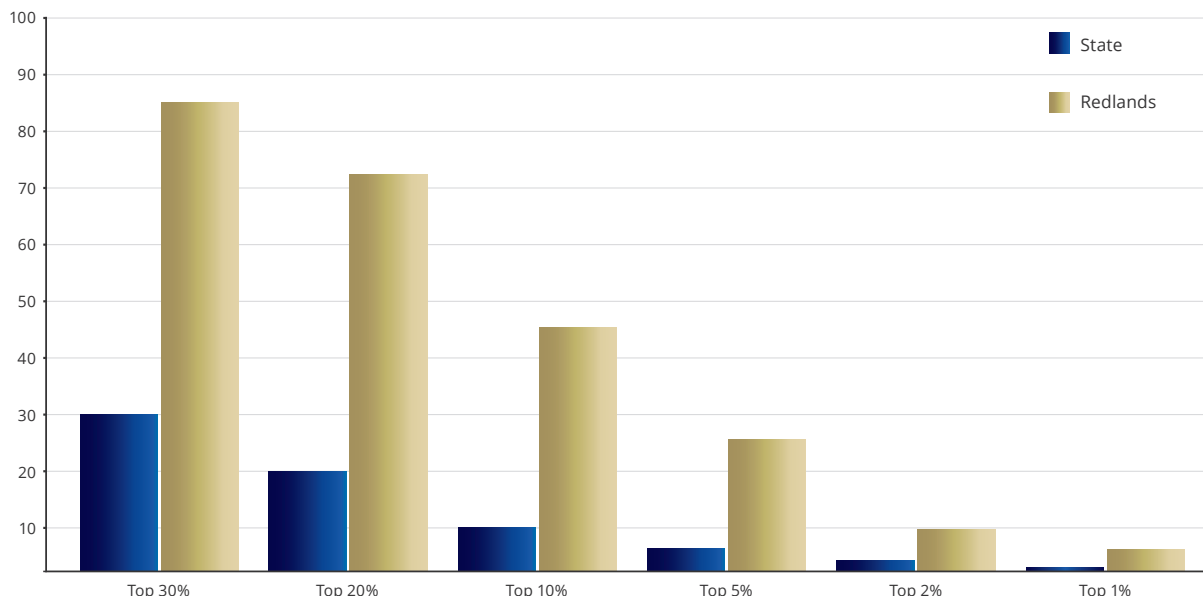

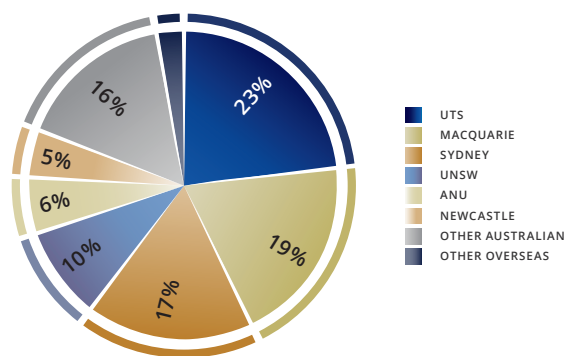

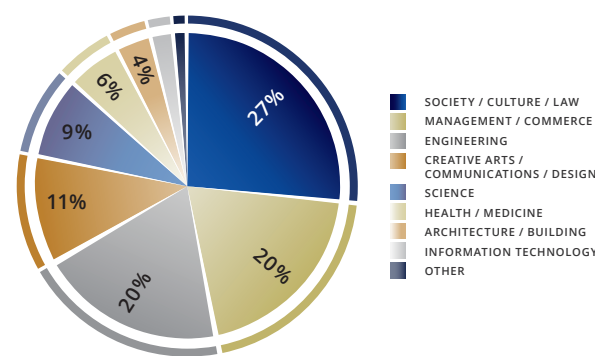

Governance

SCECGS Redlands Limited School Governance Statement

SCECGS Redlands Limited operates as a public company limited by guarantee.

Members do not have an economic interest in the assets or operating surplus of the company or the School and are not entitled to any dividends or other payments. Any surplus must be applied for the benefit of the School.

The operation of the School is overseen by a Board of Directors who do this in accordance with the purposes and objectives of the School as set out in the Constitution.

The role of the Board is to effectively represent and promote the interests of the School with a view to adding long term value to the School as an educational enterprise.

The Board operates within a highly regulated environment and complies with governance requirements of the following:

- The Corporations Act 2001
- The NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA)
- The Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission (ACNC) Act

The following provides a summary overview of the approach to corporate governance taken by the Board.

The Board has established sound foundations for School Governance and Management oversight

The Board has adopted a Board Charter which describes the role of the Board, Board procedures, the role of the Chair and Deputy Chair and the functions of Board Committees.

The Board is responsible for setting and reviewing the strategic direction of the School, as well as monitoring the implementation of that strategy by management. The Board is responsible for:

- the appointment and removal of the Principal;
- establishing policies that seek to strengthen the School;
- monitoring the performance of the Principal;
- reviewing and protecting the School's reputation;
- protecting the School's financial position;
- ensuring that the School's financial statements are true and fair and conform with the law;
- ensuring that the School adheres to high standards of ethical and corporate behaviour; and
- ensuring that the School has appropriate risk management and regulatory compliance policies in place.

The Principal is responsible for the day-to-day management of the School.

The Board has established the following standing Committees:

- Nominations and Governance
- Finance and Audit
- Risk Oversight; and
- Physical Resources.

The Board uses its best endeavours to familiarise itself with issues of concern to stakeholders. In doing so, the Board regularly evaluates economic, social, reputational and regulatory issues and changes that may affect the development of the School or the interests of stakeholders.

The Board is structured to add value

Under the Constitution of the School, the Board comprises four to six Directors who are elected by the members of SCECGS Redlands Limited, up to four Directors who are nominated by the Board and four Directors who are nominated by Sydney Diocesan Services (SDS). Directors are proposed who have the ability to make a contribution to the School through their experience, qualifications, talents and commitment to the School.

The maximum number of Board members is twelve who are all non-executives. All elective and SDS appointed Directors hold office initially for three years. Elective Directors retire by rotation in accordance with the School's Constitution. It is not generally expected that a Director would hold office for more than ten years or be nominated for more than three consecutive terms, whichever is the longer. Each triennium, the Board appoints a Chair and Deputy Chair from among the Directors.

Board Directors receive no remuneration for their services, but may be reimbursed for reasonable expenses (other than time) such as special travel, conferences and accommodation specifically for School business. The School provides Directors with indemnity and insurance cover to the extent permitted by the Corporations Act.

The Board normally holds meetings in each month of the year except outside of school term times and may hold additional meetings as the occasion requires.

The Board is comprised entirely of Independent Non-Executive Directors who, together with management, have the appropriate balance of skills, knowledge, experience and independence to meet the obligations of the Company. During 2023, the Board comprised twelve Directors, whose biographical details can be found on the previous pages.

New Directors have the benefit of an induction program aimed at deepening their understanding of the School and the environment in which the School operates.

All Directors are entitled to obtain independent professional advice relating to the affairs of the School or their responsibilities as a Director, provided that the expense is reasonable and the Director has received written approval of this expense from the Chair.

Each year the Board critically evaluates its own performance, and every third year the performance of individual Directors is evaluated by an external expert.

Director skills, experience and attributes

The Redlands Board and its Nomination and Governance Committee work to ensure that the composition of the Redlands Board has the right balance necessary to fulfil its responsibilities.

The Board aspires to reflect the community that we serve and aims to be diverse in terms of gender, personal and professional skills. The Board aims to comprise Directors with a balance of experience and expertise to administer an independent School such as Redlands. All Directors are expected to comply with the School's Code of Conduct and to be considered a "fit and proper" person able to comply with their responsibilities as Responsible Persons under the Education Act NSW (1990).

The Board skills matrix identifies the skills and experience that the Board needs to ensure effective governance of the School and to assist the School in developing strategies to respond to its changing external environment.

The table and charts on the following page reflect the Board composition of 12 Directors.

The Board promotes ethical and responsible decision-making

In forming its decisions, the Board aims to make sensible business and governance decisions, to contribute to the purpose of the School, to apply sound practical sense and to adhere to high ethical standards which are aligned to the School's values.

To inform this decision making, the Board has adopted a formal code of conduct which sets out expectations with respect to acting with reasonable care and diligence, behaviour, confidentiality, the interests of stakeholders, independence of judgement and acting honestly and fairly in the best interests of the School. In addition, the Board has adopted policies with respect to the following areas:

- conflicts of interest
- notification of related party transactions
- delegations
- confidentiality
- whistleblowing.

The Board safeguards the integrity of the corporate financial reporting

A Finance and Audit Committee reports to the Board. The committee regularly examines and makes recommendations to the Board regarding:

- approval of annual budgets
- financial risk management policies
- processes, frameworks and insurances
- compliance with financial risk policies
- accounting principles in the School's accounts; and
- the appointment of the external auditor and any internal audit activity.

The Finance and Audit Committee consists of not more than five members, one of whom is the Board Chair.

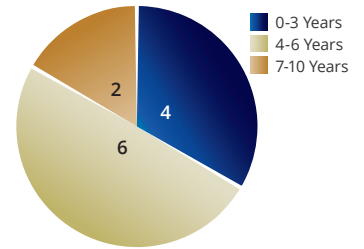

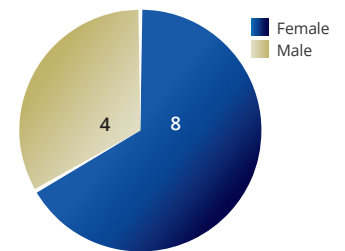
